Students from Jim Chambers Music Box's "Rock & Roll Bootcamp" recently performed their first show.

A good summer camp gives kids self confidence and new skills. For the students that came to the Jim Chambers Music Box during the week of July 17, they got all that plus a real rock concert.

Five young musicians spent mornings of the camp week playing rock music, learning their instruments and practicing to be a band. Rock & Roll Bootcamp at

Jim Chambers Music Box (JCMB) teaches kids the ins and outs of being in a rock band. Instructors, Adam and Jim, also help the band choose a name. The week culminates with the band's very first performance.

The camp band, Box on Fire, is guitarist Jake; bassist, Isa; guitarist, Louis; drummer, Luca; and vocalist, Kelsey. Two of the band members, Jake Garcia (Samara Drive) and Luca Barolo



(Lake Carroll Way), are OC residents.

The kids worked all week learning songs by Taylor Swift, Katy Perry, Elvis and The Cranberries. The following week brought one more rehearsal and the chance to get on-stage performance perfected. Students played in their very first show in front of an audience at Buckets

Eleven-year-old, Jake, says his favorite part was, "playing *Zombie* (by the Cranberries) in front of the crowd with all the other bands at the show." Jake's mom, Jenn Garcia says, "They created a rock band camp that was a fun and inspiring experience. It was amazing to watch what they were able to accomplish in 15 hours. The live show was a highlight of our summer!"

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
The Future of Space Travel: Solar Sails

People typically view science fiction as nothing more than—well—fiction. Films and novels that fall under this genre are assumed to be either enjoyable entertainment or just imagined ridiculousness. However, science fiction is linked closer to reality than most realize. For many years, authors and directors alike have created fictional works that feature fabricated technologies of the future. However, during the last century in particular, these fantasy items have started to become a reality. One particular project the science community is in the process of successfully bringing to reality are solar sails. These sails provide a new way for rocket travel by utilizing the infinite power generated by the Sun.

The concept of solar sails was born in 2005 when scientists discovered that photons, which humans view as sunlight, create solar pressure that generates a small push. By constructing solar sails out of ultrathin, a highly reflective material, photons bounce off the sail and transfer their momentum to the spacecraft. Thus, propelled by the force of the reflected sunlight, the rocket can sail across space only by relying on the Sun.

Although this project is currently underway, the original idea of using sunlight as "fuel" to move spacecrafts is not an unprecedented one. In 1865, the beloved science fiction writer Jules Verne published his novel, *From the Earth to the Moon*, in which he crafted a fictional story about a group of weapon enthusiast attempting to send a space gun into

the solar system. The characters aim to do this by harnessing sunlight for travel. Although the topic is only mentioned briefly in the book, one of the main characters states, that "there will some day appear velocities far greater than these, of which light will probably be the mechanical agent...[and] we shall one day travel to the moon, the planets, and the stars." However, the crowd of townspeople who hear of their proposed travel method is skeptical and causes the three main characters to doubt the soundness of their plan, causing them to eventually abandon it.

Although the crowd in *From the Earth to the Moon* was speculative about the success of sunlight-propelled space travel, the people of the world today have no reason to be doubtful. For, in 2018, NASA plans to launch a space probe equipped with a solar sail that will be the "first NASA spacecraft that will venture beyond Earth's orbit propelled entirely by sunlight." Currently, NASA is working to improve the durability of solar sails after they were first tested in 2010. During November of that year, NASA deployed a small craft equipped with a solar sail; however,



NASA Administrator Charles Bolden visited the Near-Earth Asteroid (NEA) Scout project at Marshall Space Flight Center on Dec. 14, 2015, in Huntsville, Alabama, where a team completed a half scale-solar sail deployment test. The test confirmed the folding technique, package efficiency, and the deployment mechanism for the solar sail.

the sail unfortunately burned up after only 80 days of space travel. Following the incident, aerospace engineers immediately began working to improve the original design. According to reports from NASA, the new upgraded design has been completed, leading them to believe that the flight next year will be successful.

While the possibility of rockets sailing on sunlight may have once seemed fictitious and improbable, that speculative stance is now one of the past. Forget the water—it is time to sail on sunlight.

Recently, I visited a prospect's home in South Tampa to do a Comparative



Market Evaluation, in preparation for selling the property. It was a somewhat older home (1970's) with two stories in sort of a Key West style. From the exterior, it had a balcony that went across the entire second floor. If you've ever been to Key West, you know the style.

The yard was also in excellent condition; although a tree in the middle of the front yard took away some of the beauty of the structure itself. Still, it made a very good first impression.

I next went inside and, unfortunately, things started downhill. The husband is retired from the military, having had many honorable tours in both stateside and combat-zone environments. There were pictures galore and plaques from every assignment he'd had. They covered the walls! There were troops in various combat attire and diplomas scattered about. This was the theme in every room. As a former military person myself, I found it interesting and an impressive testimony to a life of devotion for our Country.

However, I was there not to admire his conquests in the military, but to determine the property's value.

I heard a comment a few years ago at a Real Estate meeting that applied to this house and almost all others: "ONCE YOU DECIDE TO SELL YOUR HOUSE, IT IS NO LONGER YOUR HOUSE." In other words, you should immediately pack up all that non-essential "stuff" and move it.

"OK, Mr. Wise Guy," you say, "move it where!?" Well, there are a number of choices, such as Pods, which you can load and then easily store until you move to another home.

The point is, when a prospect comes into your house, they want to see what they are going to live in and not what you live in. Your house should look similar to what potential buyers are looking for. That means they especially don't want to look at clutter (as in the house above). Excess furniture needs to be removed. Kitchen counters need to be virtually empty. Bathroom counters need only a couple items showing.

Further, the South Tampa house was also dark inside. They had heavy curtains, partially closed, and their paint choices were dark as well. Your house should be bright, although that is sometimes more difficult to achieve with our mostly low Carrollwood ceilings. However, to achieve this "brightness," paint is one of the "best bang for your buck" expenses. Also, if drapes can be removed without creating an eyesore, consider that as well.

Many of our Carrollwood homes also have a multiple of small rooms. Unfortunately, today's buyers usually want "great rooms" or open spaces. Nevertheless, I recommend you not start tearing down walls, unless you plan to stay for a while and enjoy the result of the transition.

Finally, it's important to remember this: When buyers look at your house, they will be looking at the cost of these "needed" (in their minds) changes. They will price that into their offers unless the house has already taken that into consideration in the offering price.


